Thematic Background

Beneath the multitude of languages and dialects lies an organic interconnectedness shaped by shared modes of thought, philosophical concepts, cultural values, and epistemic traditions. The idea of the Bharatiya Bhasha Pariwar views Indian languages not as isolated systems, but as members of a living family that has evolved through continuous dialogue, mutual influence, and cultural exchange over millennia. This linguistic plurality thus embodies an architecture of oneness, where diversity functions within an integrated civilizational framework.

From classical languages to the vibrant regional and folk traditions, Indian languages have served as vehicles for the transmission of knowledge, ethics, aesthetics, and spiritual inquiry. Textual traditions, oral narratives, performative practices, and everyday linguistic expressions together constitute a continuum of the Indian Knowledge Systems. The philosophical interdependence of language, thought, and culture underscores the role of Bharatiya Bhasha as both a means of cognition and a medium of knowledge, sustaining ethical, metaphysical, and pedagogical traditions across time and space.

The “architecture of oneness” refers to this civilizational design in which linguistic diversity is harmonized through shared conceptual frameworks, translation traditions, and cultural continuity. It highlights how ideas, metaphors, and literary forms have travelled across regions, fostering mutual intelligibility at the level of thought and sensibility, even where speech differs. In consonance with the National Education Policy (NEP) 2020, the conference foregrounds the centrality of Indian languages in education, research, and knowledge creation. NEP 2020 emphasizes multilingualism, mother-tongue-based learning, and the integration of Bharatiya Gyana Parampara into academic curricula. The conference therefore seeks to explore how Indian languages can serve as foundations for a culturally rooted, intellectually rigorous, and inclusive educational ecosystem, reaffirming their role as a unifying force in India’s civilizational journey.

CALL FOR PAPERS
